- A. Written
- B. Oral
- C. What's a lease?

Everyone was reminded to (1) get their housing arrangements in writing, (2) pay by check and on time, and (3) seek help through Parker Street Ministries if they are having trouble with their landlord instead of letting the problem escalate to eviction.

Families were invited to fill out surveys about their current housing and financial status, so the staff at Parker Street Ministries can know and serve the neighborhood better.

Finally, it was time to celebrate the semester with food and crafts.

When we started the ministry we knew we needed to live among the people we were trying to reach. So we moved in. Not long after that we realized what a blessing it was to live in the Parker Street community, so we began encouraging our Christian friends to join us. They live in the 'hood and do not work for PSM but believe in our core values of "neighboring" enough to move their families to the 'hood and see God transform us all.

Over the past 16 years, with all the changes in the neighborhood, these people we call intentional residents are one of the ever-growing bright spots.

Recently, while Christy and I were away, our neighbors continued to care for each other. I heard stories about sharing tickets to a Bucs game, welcoming home husbands from prison, repairing broken-down cars, fixing doors and windows, and looking after each other's kids so date night could happen.

God has assembled an amazing group of people in this neighborhood. I pray that you will be challenged to apply this model to your own neighborhood. THANK YOU for your support. Please pray:

BRIDGING LEARNING GAPS

It was a busy first semester, and I am thankful for staff who have been so adept at responding to the variety of needs we have faced this past term.

In January classroom leader Marcus Ballard accepted a full-time teaching position at Jesse Keen Elementary. Our intent is to affect lives with our mission beyond this neighborhood, and it is my hope that Marcus is better prepared to manage a classroom and better equipped to speak for at-risk students because of his experience with us.

Student numbers have continued to increase. We are at or over capacity for most of our classes. The exception

was the low numbers we experienced in our seventh/eighth grade girls' class. Because of that, we have begun to use the space as a one-on-one tutoring area as well as a classroom.

We've also added a regular program for our high school students. Through AEP they are given the opportunity to work on homework each day in a dedicated classroom, to serve their younger neighbors in the K - 8 program, and to be enriched in a variety of ways on Tuesday evenings. Meaningful relationships between teens and adults are growing, and I'm delighted to be reaching these students at such a critical age.

Overall student progress is good, but one or two students in each of our nine classes need extra academic attention. In February we plan to provide those students a minimum of one hour of one-on-one tutoring per week. In January mid-term report cards will help us identify which students are in danger of retention and need extra interventions.

We had a wonderful group of high schoolers from UthMmpact's Leadership Program join us in October. They worked diligently to put together 72 learning centers for tutoring and classroom use. They also worked with our students to help them create a make-and-take activity based on needed academic skills. The UthImpact students toured the neighborhood as well. They were from high schools throughout Polk County and hopefully gained a better understanding of our students and neighborhood that they will take with them to their respective communities.

Finally, Nicki, our volunteer coordinator, has been working diligently to improve our partnership with the parents, which is allowing them to complete their required service hours for our program. The parents are doing a great job, and we love building relationships with them.

REVITALIZING THE NEIGHBORHOOD

I am continually challenged and reminded that God is in control. All too often I have an agenda or a schedule, and things don't go exactly the way I planned. While at first my lack of control can leave me feeling frustrated, I have realized that when I make a plan, I need to do it with the knowledge that God is still in control. This means my plans may not line up with His plans.

This has been the case with our housing projects so far. I had a big plan and a schedule, and then things didn't quite happen the way that I anticipated. For the past few months we have been doing cleanup work, demolition, and some of the required repairs to the structures. But we could go only so far with demolition permits, and we had to finally stop working because there was a delay in receiving our building permits. Mike Green of Green Construction, our partner in these renovations, has been very patient with us as we navigated the City's permitting processes. Finally, in December, when Christmas Store had all of our attention, we received the building permits from the city. With the new year, we are back in full swing working on the houses, Tuesdays through Fridays from 9am to 5pm.

Since I was not working on the houses every day in December, I had some extra time to evaluate the project scope, to look for subcontractors who will work for us at discounted rates, and to procure materials at discounts. Besides building new partnerships, we've been discussing new ways to work with our old partners at Habitat for Humanity and Keystone Challenge — all for the benefit of the neighborhood.

Finally, this God-engineered lag time allowed us opportunity to survey and dialogue with many of our families about their debt and overall financial situation, with an eye to helping stabilize their individual households.


